POOL REPORT

Well, another pool summer "down the drain!"

It was a great season because there were NO major injuries, the activities were well attended, water clarity and chemical balance were excellent. When the day-to-day operation of the pool runs smoothly the reason is because the lifeguards are doing their job. Margaret Porter and Renee Weichert were super. Also the behavior of the kids was terrific. Malicious destruction was minimal, and the kids basically followed the pool rules which is a feather in the parents' caps.

Maintenance & Repairs: We accomplished lots of projects at the pool. Five new skimmers were installed, three major valves replaced, a chlorinator rebuilt, a new pump, a new hot water heater thermostat, two gigantic leaks repaired, a new pumphouse wall, sealing & painting. in pool lights repaired, light sensor installed on a light pole, the pop machine moved to the breezeway. And of course the pool was resandblasted and painted at no cost to us ! Any pool, especially an older pool, needs constant attention and a high level of preventative maintenance.

Parties & Entertainment: This is my favorite part of the budget because I guess that I am just a party animal at heart ! We had lots of activities for young and old which were extremely successful.

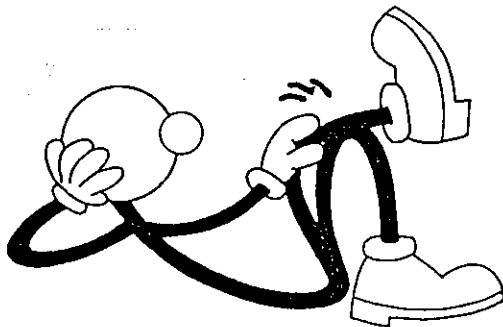
AUDIT, BY-LAWS & CALENDAR REPORT

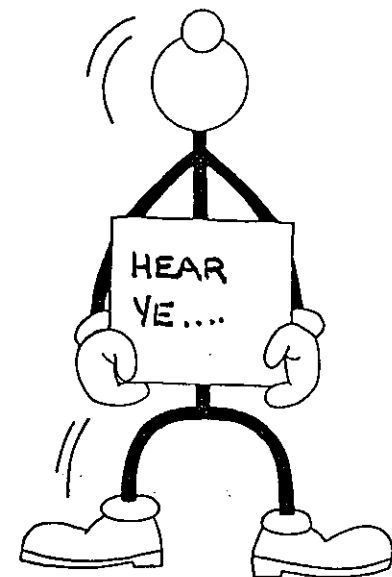

THE SPORTS COMMITTEE REPORT

At times last Spring, Noah's Ark would have floated on the tennis courts, but we landed on Araret long enough to have Michael Leister slave away to open all four teneco courts in plenty of time for play, team practise, instruction and tournaments. Mike did a splendid job and the good condition of the courts all summer attested to this preparation.

Our new Tennis Pro. Curtis Cornett is also a professional trumpet player (no pun intended, it's true) He brought enthusiasm and a very possitive attitude with him that seemed to attract the young people in group lessons as well as private instruction. He promises to return next summer, which makes the sports committee very happy. His teaching with continuity, with some of the more capable and motivated young players should produce some stars in the Ohio Valley District.

The Annual Fourth of July Tournament was co-chaired by Donna and Dave Conyers who produced the best managed affair in years.

Under the leadership of the Todds (both sets) the Jacksons, the Kooris', the Loftys and the Dohans the Paddle Tennis program last winter flourished. There were "switcheroonies", Round Robins, parent-child and father-son bashes, (some called them "tournaments") which covered most of the weekends.
