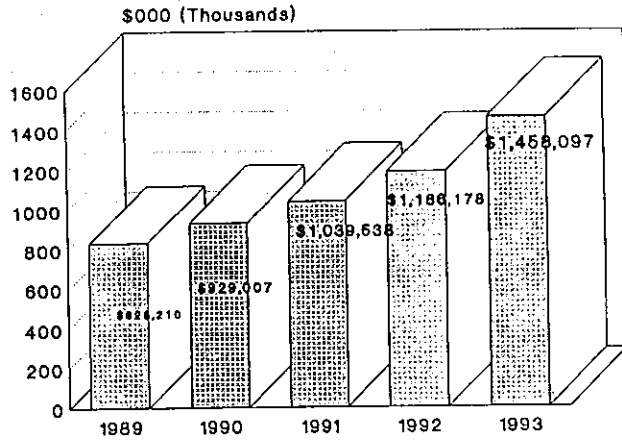

4. insured continuing financial stability as evidenced by our careful reporting, our reconstructed Bond Ladder and our special "roof fund" now valued close to \$50,000.

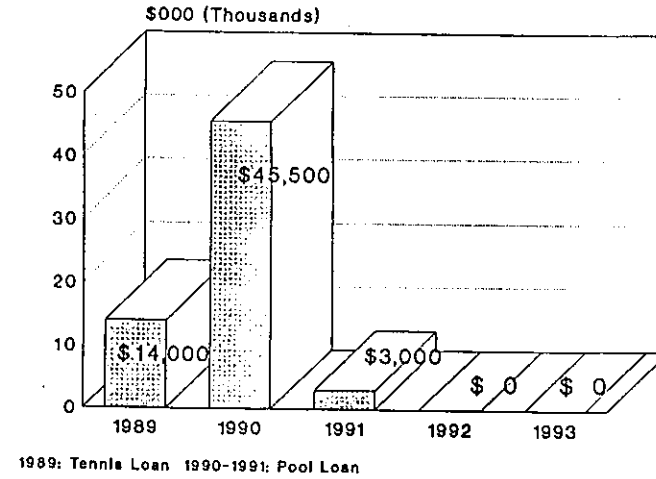

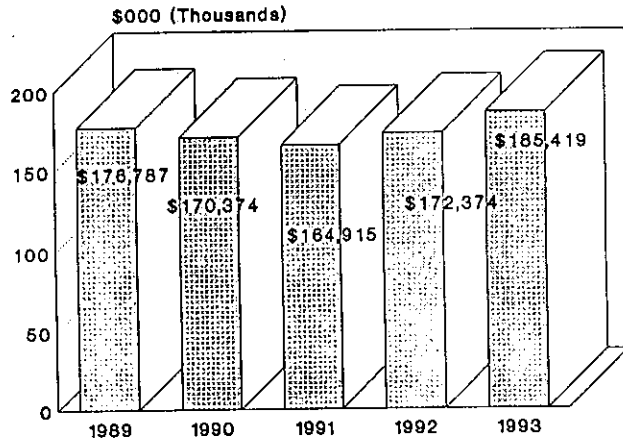
## TOTAL CURRENT ASSETS Glendale Lyceum



## TOTAL LIABILITIES Glendale Lyceum

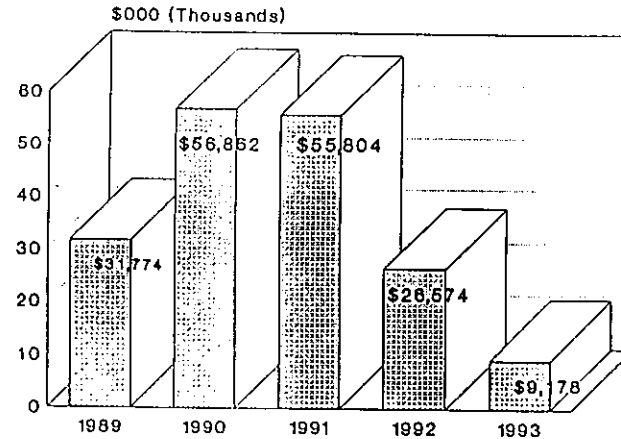


## TOTAL ANNUAL INCOME Glendale Lyceum

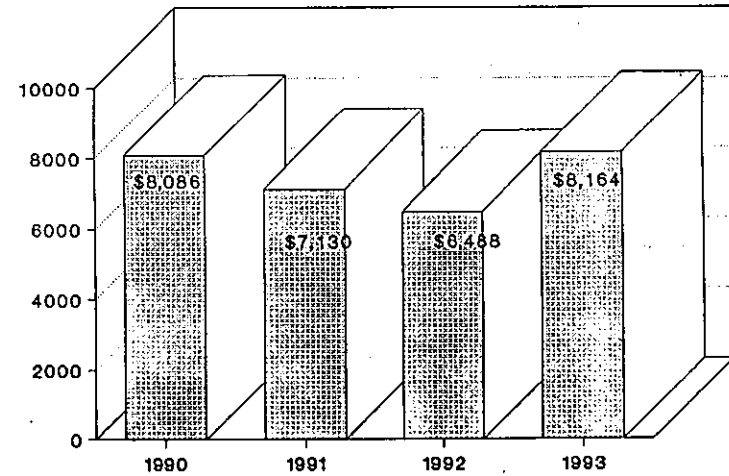
Up-to-Date copies of the Constitution and By-Laws are available upon request form the Lyceum office.

The Lyceum's safety deposit box has been checked and its contents are in order.

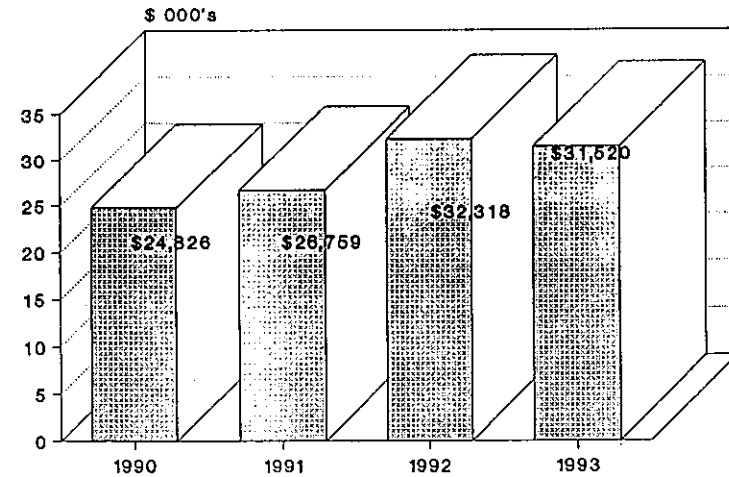

The mirror in the ladies room was replaced.

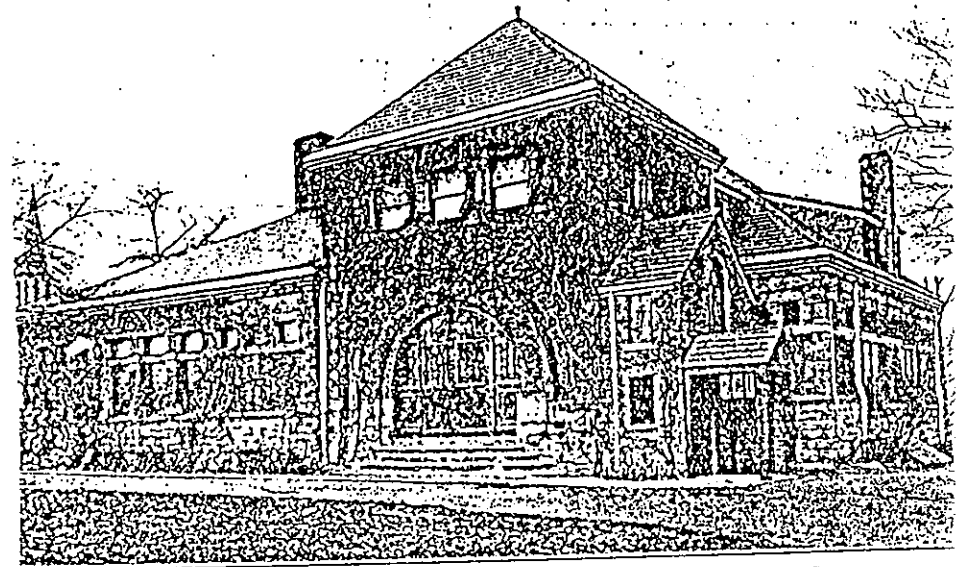
The wood work in the library and related joists were repaired, treated for termites and the affected basement ceiling areas were replastered.

Many different kinds of events were scheduled in 1993 for Youth, Drama and Education.

The first being the LECTURE SERIES.
