

At Princeton High School, Lou was in the chorus of My Fair Lady and The Sound of Music, and the lead in the Barbershop Quartet in Music Man.

He started on The Lyceum stage in 1966, singing in the chorus of The Mikado, and Professor Engel in The Student Prince, both directed by Jackie Knapp. After school in New England, Lou returned to The Glendale Lyceum Dramatic Club, and became Detective Sergeant Trotter in The Mouse Trap, under the direction of the late Nancy Gruber. He was in the chorus of Memories of Broadway and South Pacific, under the direction of Charlene Andres, whom is his voice teacher today!

Paul is his first effort as a romantic male lead in a musical, and he's having the time of his life! He is very grateful to Jackie Knapp and Charlene Andres for their help, and to his wife, Barbara, for her loving support, and feels it has been a privilege to work with Shelly and the rest of this great cast!



Joe D'Amato (Schlegal)

She appeared on the Lyceum stage as M'Lynn in Steel Magnolias, Lucy White in Cocktails for Mimi, and as Laura Curtis in Second Time Around.

Ellen Bockenstette (Set Design)

Ellen has been working with Ken on set designs for our Dramatic Club since 1981. It was her design for Mouse Trap that caught the attention of Jay Depenbrock which led to her work with the Cincinnati Opera Association, The Cincinnati Ballet and Warner Brothers. In the last year she painted sets for the Showboat Majestic's production of Carnival, the symphony's Home for The Holidays and Eric Kunzel's Christmas Show. She recently took a part time position with Patrick Kort Design Consultants as an event/party planner.

Painting is her first love. She presently has a one-man-show hanging in the lobby of the Ensemble Theatre. Her work can be seen in The Glendale Gallery, Clossons, The Art Exchange in Columbus, and Gendarme, Ltd. in Los Angeles, California.

Sherm Knapp (Set Construction)

When others say, "It's not possible to do that," Sherm can find a way! Working as half of the Knapp "team," Sherm has constructed sets for most of Jackie's shows.

For the Indian Hill Church's outdoor theater productions, he built a 30 foot spiral staircase for Mame, a forest-to-castle swinging stage for Camelot, and a revolving set for My Fair Lady.

One if his greatest challenges was a working water pump for the famous "wah-wah" scene in The Miracle Worker.

While working as V.P. Sales & Marketing for R.A. Jones & Co., Sherm had some assistance from the plant's shop for several "government jobs," but now that he is retired, set construction takes place between rounds of golf!



Ken Bockenstette (Set and Lighting)

Ken is known as the man climbing up and down the ladder, hanging lights and doing set construction. Since 1981, he has been active in every performance the Lyceum has put on. He is the designer and installer of the Lyceum lighting system.

He started in 1962 helping Dave Allen with ten high school boys and his brother-in-law. They salvaged equipment from the defunct Gaiety on Vine and rebuilt the stage and lighting system in the school auditorium. At the first performance in the re-built theatre, the stage crew was given a standing ovation in Act 1, Scene 1 as the stage revolved on its new 24-foot turntable and Marne "opened a new window."

Glenna Knapp (Stage Manager)

Glenna started with The Glendale Dramatic Club, at a very young age, in 1965 with The Mikado. She was in the school chorus. She was also in Student Prince and Oliver before moving away.

Glenna immersed herself in backstage work. She has been involved with dramas and musicals through the Indian Hill Church, Village Stage Theater Group, Loveland Stage Company (LSC) and D.T.C. She received an Orchid through ACT for stage management of Sweet Charity with LSC.

Glenna did get on stage one more time as Dr. R.T. Finsdale in L'il Abner with LSC. However her love for the theater is backstage and making the "behind the scenes" magic occur for the actors!



Sara Moravec (Assist. Choreographer)

Sara is a student of the Diana Lynn School of Dance and will be competing in Dance Masters of America the weekend of the production. Her experience in dance and with the Princeton High School Drama Club has made her an invaluable assistant to Mary Ann.

Drew Ach (Sound)

Drew has been reared in Glendale and is a sophomore at Princeton High School. He is a Junior Fireman with the Glendale Fire Department. He assisted with the staging for Don Freeman and set up the stereo system at Glendale Elementary. He has been a DJ's assistant and assisted in several pyrotechnique productions including WEBN.

Linda D'Amato (Producer)

What can be said about the woman who put together over a hundred people to allow this show to go on. Somehow she not only got "the bodies" we needed, but found the right ones for the right jobs.



Props

Judy Jones & Jody Skowronek co-chaired this task with the assistance of Cathy Hubbard and Myrna Stuart.

They had over a hundred props gathered, refurbished, created and organized by Act and Scene in record time. Not to mention, they somehow found the perfect props!

Costumes

Betty Kooris and Sue Woracheck took on the task of producing over 50 costumes that not only fit the actors, but that were appropriate for the time and era. The research in the library and on the "net" was a real time committment. In fact Betty was heard saying that this job was more time consuming than rehearsing for parts on stage! We are sure there was not one thrift shop, costume closet, attic or store that has not seen one of these ladies or their helpers in the city! What is The Glendale

The Glendale Lyceum Dramatic Club was formed as a special interest group among Lyceum members in the mid 1880's.

The shows, such as 1887's farce, Hunt the Slipper, were performed, staged and directed by Members. These productions were part of a wide variety of "Entertainments" the Lyceum provided for the people of Glendale.

In those days, the train or horse and buggy were the only means of transportation. Attending Cincinnati's cultural events was a real undertaking. The CH&D had only two evening trains returning to Glendale from the city, the 9:30 and 11:45. They were either too early or too late. The founding of the Lyceum and its Dramatic Club solved the problem by bringing culture to Glendale.

In the 1930's and 40's Stunt Nights were performed as a fund raiser for Glendale School. They were sponsored by the PTA and the Lyceum. Words and music were written by Glendalians. Many of the writers, performers, production people and directors were Lyceum Dramatic Club members.

Lyceum Dramatic Club?

In 1972, the Dramatic Club revived one of the old Stunt Nights. Everyone dug into their attics and basements. The original skits and music were found, which included the "hit" songs: "We Are the Dogs that Lie in the Streets of Glendale," (written before leash laws!), and the lovely schmaltzy "There Will Always Be a Glendale." Children and grandchildren of the original actors were in the show.

The tradition is a long one. Those of us who have been part of The Dramatic Club, either as a participant or audience, have very fond memories. The joy of participating in a creative pursuit with good friends and neighbors and applauding their efforts is rewarding and fun.

The bios of tonight's cast cover many plays performed over the last 50 years. Some programs from past performances are displayed in the phone booth as you enter The Lyceum.

Carnival is the largest production for over a decade. It has been wonderful to see all the activity and enjoyment the cast and crew has shared.
