Since her return to the Lyceum in 1996, after an absence of thirty years, Jackie has directed A Marriage Proposal, Cocktails with Mimi, The Second Time Around, The Love Course, Carnival, and Plaza Suite.

Her directing career began here with the 1966 children's production of *The Mikado*, followed by *The Student Prince*, *Oliver* and *On a Clear Day* which starred the dearly missed Shirley Bucklin.

Other credits include *Mame* in 1970 with the Princeton High School faculty, as well as *The Miracle Worker* and *The Skin of Our Teeth* for Cincinnati Country Day School.

As a founder of Village Stage in Indian Hill, Jackie directed Silent Lonely Night, Sorry Wrong Number and The Philadelphia Story. For Theatre-Under-the-Stars at the Indian Hill Church, she directed Oliver, The Music Man, Mame, Camelot and My Fair Lady.

THE ACTORS

MARY ISAACS (Libby)

Mary's first appearance on the Lyceum stage was in 1951, in a play entitled See How They Run. Since that time, she's been in numerous Stunt Nights, musicals and many one, two and three act plays. Her only explanation is simply, "I love it and I'm a real ham."

BETTY KOORIS (Sarah)

Betty has been an actor/performer since the age of 5 and her husband, Bob, can attest to her acting strangely for over 30 years! Throughout grade school, high school and college, Betty participated in numerous theatrical productions.

After a 15 year hiatus from the stage, Betty joined the Lyceum and landed the title role in The Secret Affairs of Mildred Wilde. Several Stunt Night acts, Leonard, and Cocktails With Mimi followed in the ensuing years. One of the most challenging jobs Betty ever did was to be in charge of 60 plus costumes for Carnival! In December 2000, Joe D'amato allowed Betty to direct and perform in his playwright debut, Christmas With Anton.

JACK MURRAY (Joshua)

Jack played a down-at-the-heels actor in *Cocktails With Mimi,* breaking a 60-year hiatus. Previous roles were of inanimate objects at the famous Glidden Grade School for future Down-At-The-Heels Actors in DeKalb, IL. "Thanks to spouse Lynn for teaching me the tools of the trade in this new role as a down-at-the heels handyman."

THE ACTORS

JEAN ROHLING (Tisha)

Many years ago Jean's "stage career" began with the Withrow High School Thespian Society & Minstrels, and later she chaired the Wyoming Jr. Women's Club Skit Group performing for various organizations around town. She was the neighborhood mom in Sharonville who said to the kids, "Hey kids, let's put on a show", which they did in her garage/driveway and charged 5 cents admission. She was in several faculty musicals at Princeton High School including Queen Agravain in Once Upon a Mattress.

Jean has done costumes and makeup for the Lyceum, and was the Fortune Teller in *Carnival*. "It has been quite a while since I've had to learn so many lines, but I welcome the challenge of being back "on the boards" once more."

JOE GREEN (Mr. Maranov)

In recent years, Joe was seen as the Reverend Dr. Lloyd, an Episcopal priest, in *Life With Father*; the wacky psychiatrist in *The Second Time Around*; and the hypochondriac suitor in the Chekhov farce, *A Marriage Proposal*. "These roles gave me a welcome opportunity to play for laughs after many earlier years of straight parts."

During the 50's, 60's and 70's, Joe acted in many Lyceum productions and even directed a few times.
