

Letter-writing, love topics of Glendale pl

GLENDALE – They started writing letters to each other in the second grade, and continued to write letters the rest of their lives.

Andrew Ladd and Melissa Gardner, characters in the play "Love Letters," were in love.

They were separated by distance, but connected through words on paper.

This two-act play from Broadway by A.R. Gurney is coming to the Glendale Lyceum as performed by the Glendale Lyceum Dramatic Club March 31 and April 1.

Just two people, Glendale residents Myrna Stuart and Bruce Abel, and words from written letters star in this bittersweet love story about two people who fall in love through letters.

"It explores the relationship of two people who have an emotional connection even though their lives go in separate directions," Stuart said.

"It's extremely human and touching. Their vulnerabilities show."

But what Stuart says makes the play poignant is the letters themselves. "It touches on the lost art of letter-writing," she said.

"The value of writing letters with your hand, a pen and paper," added Abel.

The letters are read on stage in the present tense as if the characters are sitting down and opening an old file, Abel said.

While most of the play involves the actors to sit and read, expressions are acted out in the way they read as if they were in the place of the writer – even letters written from a second-graders point of view.

But what makes this play unique to the two Glendalians starring in the play are the connec-

tions they have with the characters.

Like his character in the play, Abel attended Yale University and is a lawyer. "I can identify with all the places and references and to some extent the characters," he said.

"I went to Yale when it was all men. It makes weekends a lot more meaningful, if you're lucky enough to get dates on the weekend."

Likewise, Stuart identifies with a reference in the story to Perugia, Italy, where her father was born.

She also enjoys the character study of Melissa. "I learn a lot about people from the characters I play," she said.

"I like anything creative, and the creative aspect of bringing a character to life." Creativity is something she and her character, who is an artist, have in common.

Stuart has been in theater since

she was 13. She has had roles in several Lyceum productions, including "Funny Money," "Plaza Suite," and "Last of the Red Hot Lovers."

Abel also has a long history with theater – and singing. He attended the John Martin Summer Theater of Dayton and was in the Yale Freshman Glee Club.

He's starred in Lyceum plays such as "Here's Love and "Best Laid Plans," and performed in Glendale's sesquicentennial performance "The Rebels are Coming" last year.

The play's director, Joe D'amato, has been on stage for five plays and has directed four plays at the Lyceum, one of which he wrote, called "Christmas with Anton."

The play will be performed at 7:30 p.m. Friday, March 31 and Saturday, April 1, at the Glendale Lyceum Theatre, 863 Congress Ave.
