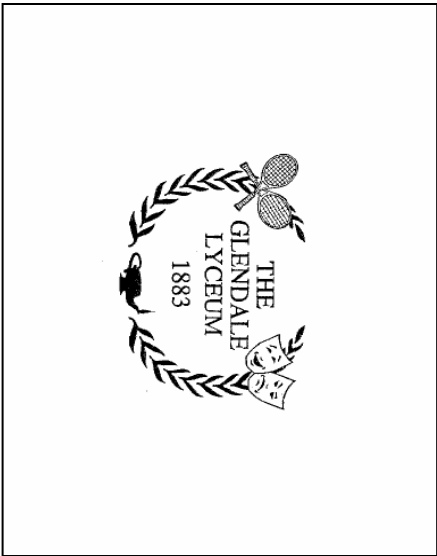

Additionally, on average the multipurpose building rents \$350 and the shelter (now the Pavilion) \$164 per year during the past seven years. However in 2010, the first full year of the Pavilion the rentals were \$750.

Finally, thanks to the initial phase of an innovative marketing plan, we can report that the Lyceum had booked nine member and twenty two non-members rentals (\$93,450) for 2011, prior to the New Year.

Bylaws Multiple sections of the bylaws were amended to reflect the adoption of a paddle only class of membership. Additionally, to reflect the current business climate, there were changes to the cost structure for non-member, business, and pavilion rentals.

Contracts To best serve the Glendale community and to provide the optimum dues structure for the Glendale Lyceum members, the Lyceum is made available for rental by both Lyceum members and non-members. To insure that the Lyceum offers an excellent value at a competitive price, I conducted a survey of venues in greater Cincinnati. In addition to rental rates, critical concerns of successful event planners include close collaboration with allied vendors, especially audio-visual, local transportation, caterers, photographers, hotels, and providers of premiums. Additional considerations are flexible floor plans, advertising and sales information, single point of contact, security, confidentiality, adequate free or reduced rate parking, and the environment. A quantitative report has been prepared but is beyond the scope of this report. Based on this survey the Board of Directors can insure a value proposition for renters of the Glendale Lyceum.

So how have we done recently? Data compiled by Ms Taylor during the past seven years, shows the Lyceum building is rented about 20 times per year each for member and non-member and 6 times per year for business rentals. These data are tabulated below and represent the number and type of rental (1st table) and dollar value (2nd table).

House and Grounds Report 2010

Next to our Members our Facilities is the most important asset that we possess. Several years ago the Board committed to a Long Range Plan that focused on maintaining and upgrading our buildings and grounds.

In 2010 we addressed a number of facilities opportunities (some more noticeable than others)

- Designed, purchased and installed new Audio Visual System under the direction of Bill Skyllingstad
- Repaired Screens on the Pool House
- Removed the evergreens in the front of the building
- Repaired the main Pool Pump
- Replaced the decking adjacent to the Paddle Courts
- Reinforced the Paddle Court Surfaces and adjusted the power to the lights
- Relandscaped areas adjacent to tennis courts and kitchen
- Cleaned up the hemlocks and evergreens across the front of the building
- Completed gutter work on shelter
- Repaired pool tiles around the perimeter of the main pool
- Removed trees adjacent to Shelter and the Pool area
- Installed a new gas burning fireplace in the Library
- Performed repairs on the main Ballroom Air Conditioner
- Repaired Drinking Fountain

Capital Expenditures

In 2010 we spent \$18,867 on capital. This was well under budget as cash flow was tight due to the loan payoffs on both loans.

Investments

- Our investment position in 2010 was 36,421 shares of P&G and 428 shares of Smuckers; the value of this stock was \$2,344,185. This was slightly down from the 2009 38,316 shares of P&G and 428 of Smuckers valued at \$2,350,140.
- In 2010 this investment generated \$71,619 in dividends, up from \$67,335 in 2009.

Debt

- At the end of 2010, we have \$240,772 of outstanding debt which has now been consolidated with a new lender at a rate of 5 ¼%

As we move into 2011 there are many positives, we saw an increase in the number of new families, rentals for 2011 are looking strong as we continue to increase this area, and we have a strong balance sheet. The biggest challenge continues to be cash management. We continue to look at all options and will consider anything that is in the best long term interest of the Lyceum without impacting the membership. I want to thank the members, the board and especially Cindy and Kevin for all of their hard work in 2010 and going into 2011 as they continue to make good things happen.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The economy continued to crawl along in 2010 and we continued to operate as normally as possible through this environment. Cash management continues to challenge and due to this fact, we spent very little on capital investment in 2010. Below are highlights of the 2010 performance:

Income

- The income from operations was \$288,277 in 2010, this included \$110,041 of rental income. This was an increase of rental income of almost \$19K over 2009 and helped offset the loss of one time shelter donations in 2009.
- The non operating income was \$178,638 in 2010, an increase from the 2009 figure of \$103,954. We sold \$119, 974 worth of stock in 2010. This was done to cover cash requirements and capital expenditures. In 2009 we sold a small amount and thus the requirements were higher in 2010.

Expense

- The operating expenses in 2010 were \$453,481 which was up from the 2009 level of \$418,932. This was driven by an increase in rentals, maintenance on the paddle courts, and wage related expenses.

Income

- Income from operations was a loss of \$165,203 and increase over the 2009 loss of \$123,671.
- Net Income in 2010 was a gain of \$13,434; this was an improvement over a loss of \$19,717 in 2009.

- Refinished Ballroom and Sunroom Floors
- Installed new double pane windows and storm door in office
- Repaired Kitchen heater
- Built decorative portable steps for front of stage

- Develop a plan for Basement Remodeling

ENTERTAINMENT REPORT

This was my second year as Entertainment Director and I enjoyed it very much. We again had a full slate of events throughout the year that were frequent and varied, with something for everyone. All events were well attended. The spirit of volunteerism is alive and strong at the Lyceum – we could not have enjoyed these wonderful events without your participation.

We started out the year with two Winter TGIFs in January and February. These cold weather “picnics” featured subs and potluck snacks, sides and desserts and made good use of our multipurpose building and our paddle courts. We were hopeful of also getting some ice-skating in, but the weather and ice rink did not cooperate last year. Super Bowl Sunday was party time at the Lyceum again, with a soup/chili menu and potluck sides & appetizers. (45) people attended. Next, we had a reprise of Joe D’Amato’s very special Valentines Dinner. (22) men prepared and served a delicious 5-course meal for their sweethearts. Men, if you haven’t tried this one before, you are missing out. As a thank you to all the members who volunteered for a committee in 2009, the Directors hosted a Volunteer Appreciation Cocktail Party February 20th. Wonderful Prizes to local Glendale Merchants were raffled to members who volunteered in 2009, with additional chances for those who signed-up to work on a 2010 committee. There was a great response for 2010 volunteers, with all of our 2010 committees getting new sign-ups. On March 6th there was a Pancake Breakfast organized by Dave Conyers and supported by a large cast of willing workers. Best Pancake Breakfast in Glendale! Spring kicked off in wonderful fashion with the Third annual Derby Party. This has become a popular theme for our spring “dance”. (52) people attended and had a wonderful time. The Mint Juleps were sweet and the Horses were fast. The Hat Contest was fun with the winner getting two free tickets to the fall Keeneland Bus Trip. At the end of May, members celebrated Memorial Day amid friends and neighbors with a traditional summer picnic of fried chicken and all the fixings. (166) members turned out. It was great to see so many of our members enjoying our outdoor facilities at the inaugural event of the summer.

Friday May 28th signaled the unofficial start of summer season and also the kick-off of the long awaited TGIF season. These weekly Lyceum cookouts on Fridays have become a cherished summer routine for many families and couples. There were (15) summer TGIF’s this year.

Average attendance was (72), down from an average of (84) in 2009, mainly due to some brutally hot and dry conditions in August. Over the summer months, (110) of you volunteered your grilling skills and made the Salads, Sides, and Desserts for these family friendly events. Many of you volunteered more than once, and our new members also pitched in to help, getting them into the tradition of volunteerism at the Lyceum. The July 4th Picnic this year again

SPORTS 2010

2010 was another great year for sports at the Glendale Lyceum. Our Platform Tennis program is in full swing and currently has a great deal of momentum. This is evidenced by the fact that we currently have 36 members rostered on four teams in Divisions 1, 3, 4 and 6. I am very pleased to report that five of the players on the Division 6 team are new to the sport.

The paddle season got off to a fast start as the Lyceum courts played host to many of the Midwest's best players during the weekend of January 15th – January 17th for the 2010 APTA Midwesterns Platform Tennis Tournament. On Saturday, March 6th we held our 2010 Paddle Tennis Club Championship. Ron Visscher and Ken Palmer defeated Carlos DeJesus and Erik Simonson to take the top prize. In addition to organizing several winter TGIF events, a mixed couples event and an instructional session for kid's, we have instituted several tournaments that we hope will become annual events. In conjunction with the GMPPA Event, we held a paddle tournament pairing a more experienced player with a less experienced player. We had a total of 16 players that formed 8 teams. This year's winners were Andy Taylor and Dan Regenold who bested Joe Hall Sr. and Joe Hall Junior in the finals. We also organized a Holiday Paddle Tournament where matches were played during the last 3 weeks of December and the finals were played on Saturday, January 8th. We invited all the men of Glendale (for a nominal charge) to join us in watching football, eating subs and drinking donated beer along with ping pong, putting and paddle tournaments. (68) men attended, including 11 non-members. Everyone had a great time and many voiced appreciation that the Lyceum picked up this traditional men's event. The event did lose money, but it was great exposure to the Lyceum for nonmembers. We plan to do it again next year, and hopefully with a better feel for the crowd size, we will come closer to breaking even.

2010 wrapped up in style at the Lyceum as (61) guests welcomed the New Year with a gala black tie optional event. The Lyceum was turned into a 1920's Speakeasy – a secret password was needed to get in and enjoy the "bathtub gin", live band and mid-evening hors d'oeuvres. Many came dressed in optional 1920's attire and there were prizes for the best dressed twenties character. There was a champagne toast at midnight and dancing until the wee hours of the morning. 2010 Pool Report

OPENING THE POOL: The pool was open this year from May 28th to September 6th. We prepared for the season by cleaning the basement under the pool house (thank you Gordon Kwiecinski, Kevin Simonson, Jackie Vaughn and Jennis Calihan for helping with this massive project!) and preparing the deck and pool house for use. Our Maintenance Professional, Dusty Rhodes, filled the pool and got us up and running without incident. After much research and debate regarding “snacks”, we decided to once again secure vending machines as an alternative to operating a poolside snack bar.

- ◆ *THE ADDITION OF A POOL SLIDE: All attempts at installing a pool slide this summer were thwarted when we discovered that Health Department Specifications would lead to more than \$10,000 in unexpected costs. This project will remain a long-range budget consideration.*

MAINTENANCE: Loose pool tiles were replaced before filling, and our pool machinery is functioning well after some emergency repairs to the pump motor mid-way through summer. Our existing deck furniture is in good shape after some scrubbing and replacement of a few worn out umbrellas. A valuable addition to the deck was a sun shade over the baby pool. Thank you to Mike Fasoldt and Bill Skyllingstad for volunteering the brains and brawn needed to complete this challenging installation.

SUNSCREEN: Many of us have been inspired by Andy Caress and the Mela-Know-More organization to provide ourselves and our families better protection from the sun. As the pool is an obvious place to improve sun protection, I hope our Addition of the baby pool shade and our always available vat of “community sunscreen” saved at least a few of us from a nasty sunburn this year.

LIFEGUARDS: We had a great collection of lifeguards in 2010. Some of our best guards from last year were able to return for all or part of the season, and we gained some outstanding guards who will hopefully join us again next year.

POOL ACTIVITIES & EVENTS: There were plenty of pool floats, tubes, and toys to entertain all who entered the pool, and a wide variety of board games and books in the “Poolside Library” for those needing a break. Our scheduled events were well attended and included:

- ◆ **Ladies’ Spa Day** –Offering manicures, pedicures, massage, lunch and kid-free pool time. Ahhhhh.
- ◆ **2 Adult Pool Parties** – One with steak & potatoes, the other a more casual pot luck.
- ◆ **Kid’s Pool Party**-This year’s theme: “The Lyceum Cup”
- ◆ **Pizza Lunches**- Every other Friday following Kid’s Camp.
- ◆ **Sunday FUNday** – Sundays at 1:00 (weather permitting) offering themed music & complimentary hotdogs. Themes included: *Parrot Heads Unite* (Jimmy Buffet), *Jamaica Mon* (Reggae), *Beach Blast* (Favorite Oldies), and *Caliente Latino Vibe*.
- ◆ **Doggie Day** – After the pool closed to humans we opened it up to the pooches!
